Lesser-Known St.Giles Facts

1938

A 'desirable suburban' home owned by HT Waterworth at 65 Amy Road was purchased by St.Giles for 5000 pounds and another 5000 pounds was spent on equipment, including an ambulance, for children from the country affected by infantile paralysis.

DEC 13, 1937

St. Giles' earliest donors were: The Ringarooma Hall committee; the CWA, the Younger Set, The Examiner Turf Contest at Ulverstone; Kings Meadows, Riverside and Longford golf clubs; Waverley Woollen Mills, Goliath Cement at Railton.

1944

Due to the WWII shortage of building materials St.Giles school didn't open until 1947.

1980s

The Supreme Cake Company at Ulverstone produced a cherry sultana cake in an airtight tin labelled "For Care of Crippled Children St.Giles".

85th St.Giles Farmhouse Appeal

Commences 2023

St.Giles started in a 9-bedroom farmhouse on Amy Road.

During our 85th year, we aim to raise \$850k to build a 4-bedroom house on the site of our original orchard.

Where once apple trees grew, with your help, we will build a contemporary "farmhouse" – a place of comfort for young people with disability.

The farmhouse will be located close to a new hub of services that target the needs of children and adults with disability.

Our ambitious project will also include the development of a café for our Abled Bread project, the re-commissioning of a heated therapy pool, expanded playground and community spaces.
